## **BHA Archive Notes**

In our previous newsletters, the Brownsville Historical Association has highlighted interns that are primarily students from the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley (UTRGV). Their time and efforts help support the BHA's mission and we are fortunate to have built a strong collaboration with UTRGV. This partnership has led to various exhibitions

and programs over the years that benefit our community and visitors alike. In addition, it has allowed the BHA to work closely with faculty and students through our shared internship program as well as research within our collections. In this issue,

we would like for you all to hear from Dr. David C. Fisher who is an Associate Professor at UTRGV that the BHA has worked closely with information developing and overseeing the current internship. His segment titled, BHA Archive Notes, touches on one of our archives and the work of another faculty member in previous years that has ultimately contributed to part of the BHA's collections.

In 2012, UT Brownsville history professor Thomas Britten

received a call for assistance from the Brownsville Chamber of Commerce about salvaging 80 years' worth of records that were in danger of water and mold destruction. Britten organized a team of students, who regrettably had to throw away some damaged


material but saved documents filling 106 boxes that now reside in the BHA archive. The material is organized thematically, chronologically, and accompanied by a helpful index.

Thematic boxes include records we would expect on

board meetings, membership, and finances. Of particular interest for some are documents that fill a box or two on topics like aviation, the Port of Brownsville, Charro Days, goodwill trips to Mexico, Christmas celebrations, and papers from Judge Oscar Dancy.

Thirty-five boxes hold miscellaneous materials organized by decade from the 1930s to the 2000s. A box from the 1960s includes files on building a better Brownsville, traffic, and developing the Padre Island National Seashore.

A quick look into any of these boxes brings back to light the day-today life of Brownsville





which included then senator Harry S. Truman, who visited the port, Fort Brown, and the airport.

As the collection is processed and digitized it will provide a wealth of valuable insights on 20th-century life in Brownsville for students, genealogists, local historians, and researchers.

The items mentioned and included preview images of archival materials within this article are all still in the process of becoming digitized with corresponding research information. The Brownsville Historical Association's Digital Collections represent our institutional commitment to making these collections, and the ideas behind them, more accessible to more people in more ways than ever. In 2020, the BHA began scaling up its collections digitization, bringing in support required for conservation, cataloging, photography, and scanning, as well as to create and maintain the technical infrastructure required for access. While more than 1,000 artifacts are on public exhibit in Heritage Museum, Stillman House Museum, Historic Brownsville

Museum, Costumes of the Americas Museum, Historic Alonso Building, and the Laureles Ranch House Museum, the Brownsville Historical Association holds many more—about 2,000 objects and hundreds more photographs and documents within our archives. Images of artifacts (a small but evergrowing subset of our entire collection) are now available online, with new objects added periodically listed under "Digital Collections" in the "Collections Overview" section of our website. Part of our digitized collections is also available on The Portal to Texas History at the University of North Texas.
